Construction Update: 1004 South Taylor Drive

We promised transformation in the last issue, and transformation is what is happening! Renovations are well underway in our new facility at 1004 S. Taylor Drive. While it may not look like much has been done from the outside other than the garage addition, the inside has seen some major changes in recent months.





Here's a peek at what else is new at the site:

- Entire existing interior has been demo'd
- Floors have been excavated to allow new plumbing for bathrooms and kitchen
- Garage addition has been built, roofed, and flooring has been poured
- Generator pad installed
- Steels study and blocking installed for office and boardroom area
- Drywall installed
- Windows installed

In the coming weeks, we are looking forward to seeing walls painted, ceilings installed, floors tiled, carpeting placed, doors hung, and woodwork finished. We project having the kitchen up and running mid-to-late November. We also have Land! The land is what makes our project so unique, as well as the subject of national attention. Our gardens will serve several functions for the program: a source of food, fresh-cut birthday bouquets, and a completely accessible, green and sensory space for clients and volunteers alike. Construction will soon begin on this key piece of the overall picture.

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The Annual Client Survey Says...

In order to gauge customer satisfaction, we send out a comprehensive survey to everybody receiving meals. We also ask clients to offer anonymous feedback so that we can address any concerns they might have. Here's what we learned:

Approximately 86% of respondents are very satisfied with the program. When asked what they like most about the program, 95% indicated they like the people who deliver the food, 78% like the fact that they do not have to cook, (respondents were allowed more than one answer) and 69% like the food.

96% of respondents are very satisfied with the food temperature. (Hot foods are delivered hot, and cold foods are delivered cold.) 90% of respondents feel safer because someone is checking on them, and 68% have help with daily living activities - some from outside agencies, but many from family and neighbors. Below is a sampling of the comments we received:



More fresh (in season) fruit and veggies would be nice.

The people that deliver the food are very, very nice & friendly.

Why doesn't the noon meal ever have pie for dessert?

Don't like red cabbage (too tart) or sauerkraut (too sour).

I appreciate the kindness shown to me.

The only food I don't eat are the tater tots.

Many portions are skimpy lately.

Thank you! Still in my own home at 97 because of Meals On Wheels.

You can't please everyone with the meals. We all have our individual tastes.

I especially like the baked fish and stewed tomato, but I don't care for the shredded pork or sweet potato.

A Surprise Bequest For Meals On Wheels

How do you thank someone you've never met for a gift you didn't expect? In early August, Meals On Wheels received a phone call informing us that our agency was named in Leone Schoen's will. But who was Leone Schoen? And why did she donate to Meals On Wheels? We did some investigating and we uncovered a lovely history....

Leone (Schwitzgoebel) Schoen was a woman of simple means - so it seemed. She attended the Sheboygan Falls Teachers College, and was a school teacher in

Adell until she retired. She kept a small apartment in her later years and drove a modest car. A life long member of Zion Covenant church, she could often be found in the office working on the newsletter, or in the kitchen for various church events.

When she wasn't serving her church, Leone spent her time serving her friends. She ran their errands, and took them to doctor appointments, even after her own health began to fail. Leone was an emergency contact for a friend who received Meals On Wheels. We never had the occasion to call Leone on behalf of her friend, but she must have seen the value in what we do for others.

Leone passed away on March 28th, 2012, at the age of 92, leaving behind a generous gift to Meals On Wheels. We are humbled and saddened to never have known the lady behind the donation, but we will remember her for her selfless desire to serve others, and her overwhelmingly generous heart.


Volunteer: Dick Nack
